Hello everyone. I am writing this in cold but sunny Clarens, wondering if it's possible to type in gloves (it is!). The start of 2024 has been filled with exciting challenges and fun learning. As you will see from this newsletter, we've been enjoying active learning opportunities, we've got a number of new, energetic staff members and we are busy fundraising for a number of exciting initiatives.

On fundraising, we have three main areas of focus locally. We are busy raising funds for an ambitious Grade 6 Trip to Durban. Our Student Representative Council (SRC) are raising money for new playground equipment. We also have our regular 'Fabulous Fortnightly Friday Fundraising' (FFFF) which is used to raise funds for class trips and end-of-year treats.

This year, we have introduced a further fundraising project which we are calling our school's 'mission'. We have linked with a family in Zomba, Malawi, who are setting up a local church that is trying to help the very poor community in that town.



Brown and Christine Masingati (pictured left), with their daughters, Carol and Petra, are contending with very tough conditions. 2024 is the second year in a row that the President of Malawi has declared a state of national emergency. By starting our mission, we are aiming to help them to impact their town and, at the same time, teach our children that they can make a difference. The learners are all really excited to participate in our mission, with the SRC even deciding to give 20% of all they raise to help!

Thank you all for your ongoing kindness and support for us – we really appreciate your love and generosity. We love that we can be part of a big global family, and that we are all in this together.




Jeannette Radebe

An Assistant for Rorisang

This is Rorisang, one of our learners in Grade 3. She is 8 years old and registered as legally blind, although she has some very limited vision. She is extremely happy at DCS and would like to stay with us for as long as possible. The options open to her for schooling, and technology, are very limited, and there is no extra funding available for her in SA, as DCS is an independent school. The only alternative specialist schooling for her would be to attend a residential special school, far from her family. Her family feel she is too young.

This year we have successfully fundraised to provide a 1:1 assistant for her, which she needs to help her with her class work, and It is possible that we would need to do the same again next year. We are very grateful to Yolanda Van den Broek for promoting this effort, and to those who have donated for Rorisang.

Grade 6 Trip to Durban

Margaret Grant has organised fundraising for our up-coming Grade 6 residential trip to the Natalia Centre, south of Durban. The trip takes place at the end of Term 3, from 16th to 19th September. Each student is committed to paying an agreed amount, and the rest will be raised through fundraising events at school and donations from friends and colleagues, mostly in the UK. Sports Update - Soccer, Netball and Cross Country.



Our students have been participating in local matches for soccer and netball, playing against Clarens Primary School, and Clarens Combined School. Our boys soccer team were successful in two of their matches, but sadly the girls lost their netball match.

Our cross country runners have now competed in 4 qualifying rounds of the national schools cross country events. In round 3 ten of our boys achieved commendable placements in their respective age groups.



In round 4, which took place on May 31st, seven of our boys were placed within the top ten of their age groups: Xolisani Xaba (8y) placed 8th, Joseph Mokoena (9y) placed 1st, David Clark (10y) placed 5th, Katleho Seshoeshoe (11y) placed 7th, Antrie Mlangeni (12y) placed 1st, Mpho Lebusa (12y) placed 10th and Michael



Clark (13y) placed 8th. Further rounds, going right up to national levels, will take place next term. We look forward to the boys building on the success they achieved last year. Well done so far!
